EXECUTIVE PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE



Dear Parents/ Carers and students,



I am delighted to again write a short piece for the Christmas TKASA newsletter. Thank you for your great support during

2020 - it has been the most testing of school years - however, our Trust has been very resilient and our Principals and staff have been absolutely first class.

I hope you continue to be very pleased with the progress at TKASA - clearly this year has been somewhat disjointed in terms of continuity of provision. However, I can assure all parents / carers that our team at TKASA, led by Mr. Jenkins, continue to do all the right things each day and with some pace. To support the team at the school we have big capital plans for 2021 at TKASA which include the completion of the reroofing of the site and some re-windowing - we anticipate another £1million+ will be needed to complete the project. A huge investment into Highbridge and Burnham-on-Sea education excellent news.

We were especially delighted this year to see such strong numbers into the Sixth Form for the recent September entry – some 90 students entered Year 12 (lower Sixth) this year which allowed us to have a total Sixth Form of around 180. This is a sustainable number – but, we hope that we can encourage even more TKASA Year 11s to join the Sixth Form in September 2021. I urge you as Year 11 parents/ carers / students please support the local Sixth provision in our town. As always, should you wish to talk with me at any time about the Sixth Form or any other issue then please do email me; I will get promptly in touch – neville.coles@theplt.org.uk. As you will know, in the early months of 2021, we will be appointing a new Principal to lead our school at TKASA - he /she will further build on the great work carried out over the last two years. As with Mr. Jenkins, we will recruit strongly and Mr. Jenkins himself will lead the process! Mr. Jenkins becomes our new Head of School Improvement working across all our three secondary schools from April 2021 - so he will have a regular and big input into the education at TKASA for some years to come. The future is looking very bright.



To end, I was delighted in November to be able to present Dawn Carey (pictured) from the mental health charity 'In Charley's



Memory' with a cheque for £13,000 – this is the charity total raised from all our schools this year towards for ICM. Thank you to all who contributed – our collecting actually ended in March so this is particularly remarkable from what was essentially a half year of fund raising activities.

Can I wish you a very happy Christmas with family and friends – we clearly look forward to a much more normal 2021.

Well what a fantastic term it has been. To see so many students getting on with their learning and making such good progress has been inspirational. Whether that has been in lessons that look much the same as they ever have or in subjects where we have had to adjust to some new ways of working, students have consistently taken the challenges head on and shown us just how much they appreciate being in school.

That is not to say that this year is not without its obstacles, remote learning or new health and safety considerations have meant that things are different this year, but with time and ingenuity these obstacles are being overcome. It gave us great pleasure last half term to re-introduce a full music and computing curriculum to key stage 3 and to see students from year 7 - 9 exploring and developing their natural ability in these subjects as always is great to see.

Students in year 9 and 11 have also been great at engaging in their remote learning tasks making sure that they keep up to date with their daily tasks and subject tasks throughout their time away from school.

As you will know at The King Alfred School Academy we are not ones to simply get things back to where they were, we are constantly moving forward and striving to do better so we can all be proud of what we have achieved.

Right across the school, students will have noticed a renewed approach to teaching and

learning. Much work has been done with school staff over both the summer and autumn term around the science of how students learn. Staff have explored the importance of effectively embedding information in students' long term memory and systematically providing opportunities to recall that information and apply it. In some cases these have been minor adjustments, however, I believe that an increased appreciation of strategies backed by scientific research will provide more effective learning tasks.

Students at key stage 3 have experienced the start of our students centered approach to this with a number of sessions around the science of how we learn. It's been impressive to see students applying learning strategies such as dual coding or regular quizzing to their home learning. I have always believed that learning and academic studies can best be thought of as a journey and that teachers must guide that journey but it is students that must make the journey for themselves. It has consequently been important for us to equip students with the independent skills to manage their own learning and together make good progress.

I look forward to seeing what the next year has in store and supporting students to great outcomes in the summer term.

THE HUMAN EVOLUTION SOCIETY

The Human Evolution Society is a group created to enrich our knowledge on the subject of human evolution; we meet on a Wednesday after school and learn about many different aspects of human origins.

We are working with a former palaeoanthropologist and myself and Grace Huggins are Co-presidents, helping coordinate activities and liaise with anthropologists in the field.

So far, we have had an introduction to the science of human origins, an overview of the last 7 million years of <u>hominin</u> evolution and an amazing presentation by Amy Taylor on the famous Taung

PSYCHOLOGICAL SOCIETY

We have enjoyed several fascinating meetings so far this term, starting with an excellent presentation by Erin Murray on bystander apathy and the bystander effect: we analysed famous experiments that suggest individuals are strongly influenced by group dynamics - in the famous smoke room study naive participants would sit in a room that was slowly filling with smoke if they were sat alongside others who were not moving.

More recently we have been looking at behavioural addictions such as gambling. Holly Saunders delivered a great presentation on the current concerns surrounding online betting and we were also joined by Dr Matt Gaskell, Clinical Lead & Consultant Psychologist for the NHS Northern Gambling Service with Clinics at Manchester, Leeds & Sunderland. It was great to question an eminent psychologist in the field who Child fossil - a 2.6 million year old human ancestor found in South Africa in 1924. During her presentation, we explored the comparative anatomy of the fossil skull, mandible and brain endocast, how it was discovered and what it can tell us about the story of human evolution.

This society can aid people in the future due to the anatomical knowledge learnt from analysing fossils and what they can tell us about biomechanics and adaptive pressures in ancestral environments. Personally, as a potential future medic, this is incredibly useful because learning the different parts of the body and their function is a large part of med school. This is also useful in other future studies in subjects including natural sciences and archaeology. For others, the society just offers the opportunity to learn more about a subject they are passionate about.

is working alongside the government to change gambling legislation. Questions included the nature versus nurture debate concerning addiction as well as the daily routines of being a cognitive psychologist - this was especially useful as many of us want to go into psychology in the future.

We followed this meeting with a really interesting presentation by Mollie Croker on addiction research in nonhuman animals: we found the study famously known as Rat Park especially interesting as it illustrated that rats recovered from addictions if they were nurtured in a stimulating



environment - a finding that has implications for how we treat human addicts.

Well, it has been quite a year...! As I sat down to write my December 2019 newsletter article, I certainly couldn't have predicted the 12 months we had in store. Moreover, I couldn't have predicted how incredibly our current Year 11 would take the disruption to their education in their strides. From the initial school closure in March, to the spring of online learning and the summer of weekly catch up sessions in school, this bunch have taken everything that's been thrown at them. November saw us appointing a superb group of 50 prefects who will undertake a wide range of responsibilities across the school and are soon to don their new prefect ties. They are led by our student leadership team and our Head Boy and Head Girl: Darragh Joyce and Grace Chambers. Darragh and Grace fought off some incredibly strong competition to be appointed to their prestigious roles. They have both begun to implement their school improvement projects – watch this space!

Students are now starting to look forward to next year and many have applied to the 6th Form and to colleges. 

Students took a guided




canal cruise where they explored the history and architecture of the city. Of course the Van Gogh museum was a must see and students found this very inspirational.

form something of quality. We are so proud of them and are really looking forward to their next performances later in the year.


YEAR 11 PERFORMANCES



BUSINESS STUDIES

In Business Studies Year 10 students have made a great start to their GCSE course. They have completed the first unit (Business in the Real World) and have learnt about the purpose and nature of business, what it takes to be an entrepreneur, different types of business ownership, different stakeholders, business planning and how to grow a business. They are currently studying the importance of external influences on business such as e-commerce, the economic climate, globalisation, ethical & environmental issues, legislation and competition, and how businesses change in response to these influences.

The Year 11 Business students have completed the fifth unit of the GCSE course (business finance) and, following their PPE, they have now begun studying their final module which looks at external influences on business. We plan to have completed teaching all the curriculum content by February half term which will leave us with plenty of time to revisit some of the trickier areas of the course and work on developing expert exam technique. The provisional dates for the two final exams are 16th June and 28th June. A reminder that all students have been issued with a revision guide that covers the entire course content, which they can keep until they have completed their final exams at the end of year 11. They will also be issued with a revision workbook once we have finished teaching the final unit. Students also have access to useful revision material through the student shared area, google drive and the Seneca website.

The sixth form business students are working hard on their A level studies. The Year 13s are currently studying the external forces that affect business strategy. The provisional dates for their three final exams are 11th June, 18th June and 24th June. Meanwhile the Year 12 class have made a great start to the course and are currently studying the marketing functional area, having already learnt about business aims and objectives, different ownership formats, management and leadership styles, decision making and the relationship with different stakeholders. We are fortunate to have two overseas students in our Year 12 class who bring a great added dimension to our class discussions.

Several business students from the sixth form are also involved in the new Young Enterprise company called Bish Bash Box. They have sold shares to finance their start-up costs, allocated roles and responsibilities and have been discussing a range of business ideas. Like all businesses, the students running this company are having to adapt to the current restrictions, giving them fantastic life skills. More details about Young Enterprise will appear in future issues and on the sixth form pages of our newsletters.

As always, I encourage all business students to follow business news stories on a daily basis so that they can relate what they are learning in the classroom to the real world. The impact on businesses of Covid, Brexit and the US presidential election have been regular topics of discussion this term. Students can also follow me on twitter: @TKASAMrKing.

COMPUTER SCIENCE AND IMEDIA



COMPUTER SCIENCE

In the first cycle, all of our key stage 3 students were engaged in а comprehensive learning and recovery curriculum designed specifically to prepare students to enhance their own learning ability. It was fantastic to see students engaging really well and helping them to understand how to use learning skills to help their memory recall which is essential to their future academic successes. A number of students initially believed that their own ability to recall information as guite poor but after helping them to understand how to engage with information in a number of different ways, they better understand how to encode information to their long-term memory and as a result, recall this information much more effectively. Students also understand that to revisit information regularly over a period of time is essential in embedding this into their long-term memory, greatly improving their ability to perform in a test or examination scenario.

Year 7, 8 & 9 are adapting well to the initial challenges of engaging with the ICT curriculum using iPads in the classroom. They have shown great resilience and perseverance in coming to terms with interacting differently with a

new interface and we are now seeing fantastic work that we can celebrate in class from all year groups through the google classrooms. We are confident that while circumstances were not originally ideal with access to technology in the classroom, we have created a suitable provision for students to engage with ICT successfully.

In iMedia our year 11s are currently working hard towards completing their mandatory units for January. The 'Saturn Explorer' assignment requires them to work to a client brief and create a book cover design. The students have responded really well to the requirements of this client brief and they have created some fantastic designs. We look forward to them sitting the exams on January 11th and concluding 50% of the course requirements.

In year 10, students are currently engaging with a mock assignment based on designing the packaging for seasonal flavours of a well-known yoghurt brand. They have adapted well to the



challenge of year 10 and are developing their skills in the use of Adobe Photoshop very well. We have seen some fantastic creative responses to the brief although some of the flavours of yoghurt might not appeal to everyone's palate. Well done year 10 for their excellent and creative response!

In computer science, year 13 students are working very well towards their NEA assignments. All assignments look like excellent projects and we look forward to them being realised in the near future. We welcome students onto the A level course from Priory into year 12, all of which have settled well and are making a fantastic impression with some super talent in all areas of TPLT trust from computer science clear to see.

GEOGRAPHY

TKASA GEOGRAPHY

Despite the challenges of 2020, the Geography department has still been active and engaged. The year started with a focus on climate change; students held a fundraiser for the response to the Australian bushfires and Mrs Owen met with representatives of Sedgemoor District Council to discuss the work being done in the school.



Year 7 students studied the 'Extreme Environments' topic and produced excellent biomes models. During lockdown we also received impressive pieces of work in response to the challenges we set, including beautiful representations of students' favourite places.

The lockdown meant that the Annual Geographical Association Conference went online, but Mrs Owen still attended and presented a workshop on critical thinking. She was delighted to be presented with an Outstanding Service Diploma for her work on the International Special Interest Group over the last decade.

After Easter the Geography department ran sessions for children of key workers who were attending school, including creating 3D models of volcanoes and learning about refugees in Uganda during Refugee Week.

The summer term also saw Mr Profitt graduate as a Master of Volcanology and we are very glad that he has now joined TKASA staff on a permanent basis.



Our department has kept in touch with St Charles Lwanga, our link school in Kampala. During the summer Mr Witts and Mrs Owen set up a fundraiser to provide support for teachers in the thirty schools they work with in Kampala, raising over a thousand pounds, which was used to buy food for teachers who have not received wages since March. We are also delighted that the new TKASA toilet block is linked with a toilet block in a school in Uganda, meaning that the Ugandan school has been given money to improve their facilities.

Technology has enabled us to keep in contact with our friends in Uganda, but has also opened up other possibilities for us. In November A level geographers were able to attend an online lecture specially organised for them by Professor Gerd Masselink from the University of Plymouth, learning about his research into the impact of storms on the beaches of the South West of England.

We were so sad that our year 11 and 13 students had to leave us early last year, but are happy to have welcomed so many year 11 students back into year 12 to study geography and sociology. Several year 13 students are now at university

studying geography or sociology and it has been a pleasure to work with our current year 13 students on their university applications this term.





ENGLISH










ENGLISH

As with the other subjects, it has been a different start to the year in the English department. We have enjoyed welcoming Year 7 - they have made a fantastic start to their time at the school. In these times of not being able to travel, they have been virtual tourists journeying around the world visiting places from Devonshire to the Himalayas. They have been learning about travel writing skills and analysing how writers use language. In Learning Cycle Two, they will be studying 'The Tempest' - a Shakespeare play with all the exciting ingredients of magic, betrayal, love and forgiveness.

Year 8 have been exploring love poetry looking at different kinds of love and also looked at love in different cultures, such as in the poem 'Singh Song'. Year 8 have finished the Poetry Learning Cycle with their own version of a Poetry Slam. A Poetry Slam is a type of spoken-word performance that strays from the traditional forms of poetry writing. Our year 8's tackled tricky subjects such as politics, climate-change and lockdown in their slams which filled the classroom with debate, energy and enthusiasm. Well done year 8! During Cycle Two they will be comedic studying play about а misunderstandings love and deception in 'Much Ado About Nothing '.

Year 9 have explored classical literature looking at Greek mythology in preparation for investigating three themes of one of Shakespeare's greatest tragedies – the classic 'Romeo and Juliet'. As you can tell, Shakespeare is a big theme in our Key Stage Three at the moment! In Year 10, English is divided into two subjects – English Literature and English Language. These subjects are taught by two teachers, yet have considerable overlap, so teachers work closely together to give students the best experience whilst developing subtly different skills. The students in Year 10 have experienced reading about the 'tight-fisted' Scrooge and his eventual redemption. Meanwhile, Year 11s, who will have just finished their PPES on 'Macbeth ' and Unseen

Poetry are now busy getting ready for their examinations in the summer. We are extremely impressed by their work ethic and attendance at P6 on Thursdays – they are a credit to the school and great role models for the younger students in English.

has a different aura.






HISTORY

Although it has been a strange start to the new academic year, it is great to see how much History students have enjoyed their learning across the key stages.

Our new Year 7 students have done a great job in developing their skills of explanation. All have successfully explained why William won the Battle of Hastings in 1066 and enjoyed looking at his methods of control.

In Year 8, students have been learning about what lay behind the horrors of the slave trade. They focussed on the 19th century campaign to end slavery led by men like William Wilberforce and Thomas Clarkson.

In Year 9, we really challenged students by getting them to explore the reasons for the





Russian Revolution of 1917, communist ideology and the fate of the Russian royal family.

We have been really impressed by the way that our Year 10 students have started their GCSE course. All their lessons have incorporated science of learning techniques which has enabled them to produce some really good exam answers on the causes of the Second World War and the early years of the Cold War. Similarly, Year 12 have started their A level course with great enthusiasm.

Enormous amounts of praise need to be directed to our Year 11 students who have coped so well with the increased pace as we get through the content of our course. Similarly, our Year 13 students have faced the same hurdles, but with their great positivity and determination, they have made rapid progress.

One thing I am keeping in mind is our future planning for trips to the battlefields of the First World War in France and Belgium and our trip to Auschwitz, Poland. We will return to these places.






RELIGIOUS STUDIES NEWS






USING HEGARTY MATHS
