

YEAR 12 WORK EXPERIENCE

In preparation for releasing our Year 12 students into the world of work for the week from 12th - 16th June, we have been providing a range of advice, inspiration and support to aid them in their search for work placements. Since January, every single student has benefitted from having a one-to-one careers appointment with Mr Wilmot, in which they had the opportunity to discuss their Post-18 and career aspirations allowing them to recognise and pursue the most beneficial placements for them. Following these appointments, a number of students have successfully secured placements within animal care, education, marketing, computer programming and public services!



For those students who have not yet been able to secure a work placement, we are now running group workshops to offer further support and will continue to do so until all students have confirmed placements. With the deadline to secure placements quickly approaching (21st April) we recently held a Work Experience assembly, hoping to motivate and enlighten the students in terms of the opportunities that can be available to them should they take a proactive approach. To achieve this, we invited a selection of Year 13 students to present their experiences, how they secured their placements, the type of work they were required to do, and the opportunities and positive outcomes that can come from a successful work placement. We heard from Jack Clark who spoke about his time with Global Action Plan, how the role required him to work from different locations, including Bristol and London, and even deliver a presentation at a teacher conference day on the topic of the importance of student-led eco committees in schools. He discussed the benefits of the placement in terms of networking and the avenues it has opened up in terms of his Post-18 route.

Rhys Anderson also joined us, sharing a selection of his published articles that he had written during his work experience week which saw him working alongside the editor of a local newspaper. This placement was key in Rhys recognising that journalism is in fact a career he would like to pursue, and the work that he was able to produce during this time helped him build a portfolio that assisted him in securing an unconditional university offer from Gloucestershire University.

We hope that hearing some of our success stories from last year will help our year 12 students recognise that they have the chance to form some strong foundations for their future careers if they take full advantage of the opportunity!

Welcome to our International students that arrived in January. We feel like you have been here a while but not since the last newsletter so we would like to take this opportunity to officially welcome you and it will be a sad day when you all leave us!

LESSONS FROM AUSCHWITZ



Five of our students with a passion for history were lucky enough to take part in a project delivered by the Holocaust Educational Trust, who work to ensure that people from every background are educated about the Holocaust and the important lessons to be learned for today. As part of the project, the students were provided with the opportunity to travel to Poland to visit concentration camps. Grace Anderson shares her thoughts on this rare and eye opening experience, as well as her involvement in the project itself:

"We had an online seminar before and after the visit. One was about Jewish life before the war and we were taught about Jewish life styles.

We visited two camps Auschwitz I, the main camp in Oświęci and Auschwitz II-Birkenau, a concentration and extermination camp with gas chambers; On the tour we travelled to the camps and during the fist part we had head phones on which linked to a specialist tour guide to give us an insight around the camp and explaining what happened in each area we visited and then for the other camp we had the same tour guide caring on telling us more information, we also had a Jewish rabbi telling us how it is still relevant today."

The purpose of the whole project was for us to be more aware that the holocaust is relevant today because issues of hate crimes and minority groups are still marginalised in society and we are responsible for changing this to make society a safer place for us all. It also gave us a chance to see victims more than just number that they were humans just like the rest of us. We gained an understanding that the holocaust had a global impacts which were very long lasting. We had to write a 500 word essay and a next steps project to demonstrate what we learnt."


YEAR 7 BIOMES PROJECT



NEW POST 16 COURSE



READING

READING

HOW CAN YOU SUPPORT YOUR CHILD'S READING AT HOME?

- Sharing your experiences about why reading is important for life and work, whilst being mindful not to add to any negative feelings, can help children to see that everyone struggles with certain things but it's worth persevering.
- Avoid reading being seen as a chore through requests such as 'if you read for 15 minutes, you can...'. Whilst this may work for some young people, it is unlikely to lead to reading being seen as an enjoyable activity.
- Research by the National Literacy Trust showed that reading for pleasure increased during the 2020-2021 lockdowns; one of the reasons young people gave for this was having the time to read and having fewer distractions. This would suggest that helping your child to balance their time and factor reading into their schedule in a quiet environment would be beneficial.
- Help your child to be proactive in their wider reading. For example, if they are covering World War II, explore age-appropriate texts on this through poetry, online articles or novels.
- Take an interest in what they're reading and studying at school by reading around topics as well so that you can engage in discussion about their texts/areas of learning, whilst modelling an interest in reading.
- Help your child to experience feeling successful with reading. Praise and encourage them, whilst showing interest in what they've read.
- Support your child with selecting age-appropriate texts for them to read for pleasure, rather than only encouraging them to read for schoolwork.
- Often younger children enjoy reading with their parents and their interest wanes when it becomes an independent activity and they no longer share a connection with someone over a book. Read with them or listen to audiobooks together as a family.

Year 11 students from TKASA have been coming in on Tuesdays after school and many outfits have been reserved as prom fast approaches.


